## THE MHOW HOUNDS

### A Kill in the Open Country

MHOW, DECEMBER 20.

WING to a Staff Exercise the meet was held on Friday this week instead off Thursday. From the Cricket ground we moved off about 6:35 a. m., and drew the Dodford sugar cane when a jack was found at once. He dwelt only a minute and then made off straight for Hema with hounds in full cry behind him. This was a very fast two and a half miles and dead straight. When the jack reached Hema he was only two or three lengths in front of the leading hounds but he managed to double round a bush and shunk off left handed over a spur of the hill. Hounds hunted him over the spur but immediately beyond this they checked and then picked up a line which proved to be that of a fox. Some five or six hundred yards further on the fox was seen and hounds were brought back to try for the hunted jack but too long a time had passed and they could not own the line again.

The Master then moved off across country with the hope of picking up a jack in the open but none were seen till we reached Long Acres.

### TWO JACK SEEN

Here two were seen entering some sugar cane and one was soon away and out into the open country. After a short but straight and fast hunt he was pulled down in the open by Helpmate, one of the young hounds from the Pytchley.

A fresh jack was then found in Long Acres and hunted out into open country by the veteran Galloper. Hounds ran him to the jungle country at Nandlai when they were stopped. Long Acres then yielded yet another jack who was hunted about between various patches of covert until scent got too weak to hunt further. Hounds were then taken home.

Unfortunately on this day Colonel P. H. Henderson, who has shown many younger ones the way to go, met with a nasty accident, and will, it is feared, be unable to hunt for some time.

### Six Jack Accounted for in Two Days

MHOW, DECEMBER 26.

Thursday, December 26, on the Race Course:

On leaving the meet hounds touched on the drag of a jack which they followed into a patch of sugar cane. Here the jack was quickly unkenelled and after dwelling a minute or two broke away across the nullah and then right handed to some very thick covert close to Mau village.

There was a second jack in this covert who went away but hounds were taken back and picked up the hunted jack afresh, hunting back the other side of the nullah to his original sugar cane. After dwelling for a little he went away with hounds close behind him, but unfortunately ran right into the village of Shaida, where scent was completely lost.

Subsequently, a line was picked up some distance the other side of the village, and hounds hunted this cold line for a long distance left handed.

### A BIG JACK

The Mau sugar canes were then drawn and yielded a big jack who made straight for Hema; at first hounds hunted strongly, but on the long open sun-baked slopes leading up towards Hema, scent was almost non-existent. On Hema itself scent was better and the jack was hunted on falling scent almost as far as the earths out by Bardala.

On the way back towards Mhow a jack jumped up practically in the pack and ran straight up wind to Dodford with hounds on his bush all the way. In Dodford this jack was killed and another was chopped.

Hounds then returned to kennels, having killed six jack in two days.

### MHOW HOUNDS

#### Good Sport But No Kill

Sunday, December 29, 1929, 2½ Miles from Simrode Road.—This was a very good day from the point of view of the field and provided the horses with plenty of galloping and jumping, but unfortunately we did not kill.

Hounds were first taken across the open on the North of the road and before long two jack were seen and hounds layed on. After a quarter of a mile the jack separated and the pack split momentarily but soon settled to the line of the right-hand jack who made straight for the enclosed nullah country. After running a dusty lane and skirting a village this jack made for the open once more, but unfortunately two checks gave him too much of a start and he ran us gradually out of scent.

#### ANOTHER JACK

A fresh jack was found in the sugar cane beyond Harsola and made straight for the open with Piper, one of the young Pytchley hounds, in enthusiastic pursuit. This jack gave us a long gallop in the open before returning right handed to the nullah country and during this gallop Grampian, a young Belvoir hound, led nearly all the way.

In the nullah country the hunt continued with only very slightly diminished speed and the field got plenty of jumping. Hounds stuck to this jack very creditably and finally marked to ground in the same earth as we ran to once before.

#### SOME GOOD SPORT

Thursday, January 2, 1930. Kodria Village.—Hounds were taken first to the heavy sugar canes near the railway which have not yet been drawn this season and quickly found. This jack broke to the next sugar cane but would not go further and was speedily killed.

After this, a patch of sugar cane was drawn blank, except for one lynx cat which was also killed. Finally a jack was found near the rifle ranges and went away behind the butts towards Asapura. However, to our dismay at that very moment came the sound of rifle fire from the ranges and much precious time was lost in speculating about safety before hounds were finally layed on.

#### POOR SCENT

The jack was one of the first and went straight through Asapura, but owing to our bad start we ran out of scent about Asapura.

Returning to the Kodria area another jack was found and hunted from sugar cane to sugar cane for some time, but the sun was now high and hounds hunted with increasing difficulty till they finally lost and were taken home.

## SEVERAL JACK LOST

### Mhow Hounds Unlucky

Hounds met on Sunday, January 5, on the Fort P<sup>t</sup>'s ground. Contrary to usual practices the Master began by drawing down the Gambia and hounds soon picked up the line of a jack and ran out into the open country where scent was lost.

A second jack was picked up in the open but scent seemed hopeless and hounds with difficulty hunted as far as Hema. Here a jack was viewed in the open. After half a mile, however, hounds changed on to a fox who jumped up just in front of them.

This fox gave us a good hunt. He ran to 4th Milestone Hill, then doubled back and bore round right-handed to his original direction. He reached the thick nullah country beyond Hema just ahead of hounds though they stuck to his thick covert eventually beat hounds and they stuck to his line for a considerable time.

#### LITTLE SCENT

Another jack was then viewed in the open but hounds followed with difficulty for throughout the day there seemed little scent on the open slopes. This one, however, quickly turned into the thick country where hounds pushed him hard. At one point a second jack went away losing us temporarily two couple of good hounds.

The deciding point, however, was when we reached an almost vertical cliff up which the jack had managed to make his way. Two couple of hounds managed to follow him, but checked half a mile further on and by the time the rest of the pack arrived hounds could not own the line.

By this time it was very warm and hounds were taken home.



## JACK ESCAPES IN THE GHATS

### CHATS

#### Some Thrills for the Mhow Hunt

HOUNDS of the Mhow Hunt met on January 9 at the 2nd milestone on the Simrole road.

Moving off across the open North of the Simrole Road, hounds picked up a stale line but were stopped. Shortly after they picked up another line which seemed fresher and they were allowed to hunt.

This jack provided us with a grand gallop. At first he must have been a longish way ahead of hounds as he was not seen at the start even by the first whipper-in who was well ahead and in open country. Hounds hunted Eastwards at first and at a steady pace bearing gradually right-handed till they swung across the Simrole Road between the third and fourth milestones, with the pace gradually improving as they worked up on their jack.

The first serious check occurred near Guraria when the jack crossed a big nullah full of water but the line was recovered.

Very shortly after the jack was seen stealing along the edge of a crop just in front and as hounds were then on some bad scenting ground, they were lifted and layed on closer behind him.

Unfortunately, at this point, a train came along the railway line which was close at hand, and hounds had to be whipped off and held up till it had passed.

#### TO THE GHATS

They were then layed on again and streamed forward close behind the train as though determined to catch it. Actually the jack had crossed the railway on a gradual slant just ahead of the train and the Kodria Nullah Bridge made a convenient crossing place for the field. Hounds were now running fast due South leaving all the Kodria sugar canes on their right.

Two jack were seen to swing round right-handed and return to the Kodria sugar canes but hounds never wavered and held straight on towards the Ghats.

Before Patalpani Station, when the train was left behind, the jack came in sight again ahead and shortly afterwards the whole pack poured down the ghats not much more than one hundred yards behind the jack.

The hunt staff and the leading members of the field followed as far down the ghats as it was possible to ride but hounds passed out of hearing in the distance.

After much horn blowing the pack were eventually recovered and taken home.

## THE MHOW HOUNDS

### A well Worked Plan

Hounds met on Thursday, February 26, at Haunted House on the Neemuch Road.

Owing to the Dodford sugarcane having been cut down some time had passed since we last pursued the Hemra jack. This meet was arranged with a view to finding one of the old customers in their new quarters and luckily the plan worked well. A line of one of them was picked up in the nullah North of Dodford and this resulted in a long straight hunt.

Crossing the open country West of Mhow we had a nice gallop at a moderate pace; on approaching Richnbari the pack divided but the left hand lot were stopped and brought over to the right quite quickly.


Subsequently, hounds hunted well but with some difficulty across the Akwi nullah on what appeared to be a double line and sure enough a little later two jack came in view ahead. Unfortunately scent on the open slopes near Kesarbari was poor and at this critical moment a buck chose to cross the line immediately in front of hounds. They were quickly stopped but this was really the end of the hunt for although hounds were held forward to the Jamli nullah they could not hit off the line there.

### A CHECK

A fresh jack was found in sugarcane near Jamli and started to run North along the nullah until he turned out of it at right angles, producing a check. A slow hunt followed until a jack was seen ahead. He promptly went up Nandlai into unridable country so hounds were stopped.

A further jack was found in sugarcane near the 17th Milestone on the Bombay Road and then a little later a fresh jack who gave us a surprisingly good hunt for so late in the morning was viewed away. Hounds ran fast for several miles along the Akwi nullah but in the end the sun got the better of the scent and the jack was lost.

This was a good morning, plenty of jack were seen and hounds hunted very well considering that at no time was there much scent.



### SIX MILE POINT

On Sunday, February 23, we were provided with the best hunt of the season though there was no kill. On leaving the meet at the race course, two jack were seen going left handed over some ploughed fields and hounds were immediately layed on.

They ran to Man Village, then right-handed along the nullah and then sharp left again. Hounds lost little time, however, over all this twisting and the jack presently realised that it was not safe to hang about. Accordingly, he set off in good earnest for Fourth Milestone Hill and gave us a fine gallop across the open. This hill is just four miles as the crow flies from where we found and as we approached it hounds were gaining fast.

### A FRESH JACK

The jack, however, reached the hill and on the hill we no doubt changed on to a fresh jack. This was soon realised but it was then too late to go back.

Our new pilot led us across the Neemuch Road close past Karondia then back across the Neemuch Road by the Sixth milestone and so into jungle country which he reached only just in front of hounds. He then proceeded to run rings in difficult country not very far short of Akola until he was lost.

Hounds ran fast from the meet at dawn till it was too hot to hunt further and must altogether have covered a very long distance, though the actual point was only just a little over six miles.



## FATAL ADMIRATION

"Jack" Who Watched Hounds  
Too Long

MHOW FORT, MARCH 2.

The gardens on the left of the Bombay Road were first drawn and a jack went away on the far side, but hounds could not pick up the line. Next we drew some bearded wheat at Beechborough and a jack went away across the Bombay Road with Pipe leading the pack.

We soon drew out into open country and ran fast towards Richarbarli; hounds changed from scent to view and shortly after Lévy and Harper rolled the jack over in the open.

After returning to the Gambia Nullah a jack was seen sitting out in the open admiring the hounds and a stealthy approach resulted in getting the hounds started on good terms.

The jack made for Gauli Palasia, then turned into Long Acres with hounds in full cry only a few lengths behind; it then proceeded to dwell in various patches of wheat till finally it was killed.

A further jack was found and ran along the nullah to Nandai but we lost time over a check by a road and were run out of scent before reaching the jungle country when, of course, we should in any case have had to whip off. Turning towards home a jack was put up near Richarbarli and hounds were layed on successfully after a little difficulty as there was a fox afoot too and he was closer to the hounds.

This jack very conveniently gave us a good fast gallop straight back towards the cricket ground, but on reaching the Gambia Nullah he turned at right angles to the right and ran up it towards the Bombay Road bridge. Here we lost.

This was a good day with two good gallops and two jack accounted for.
